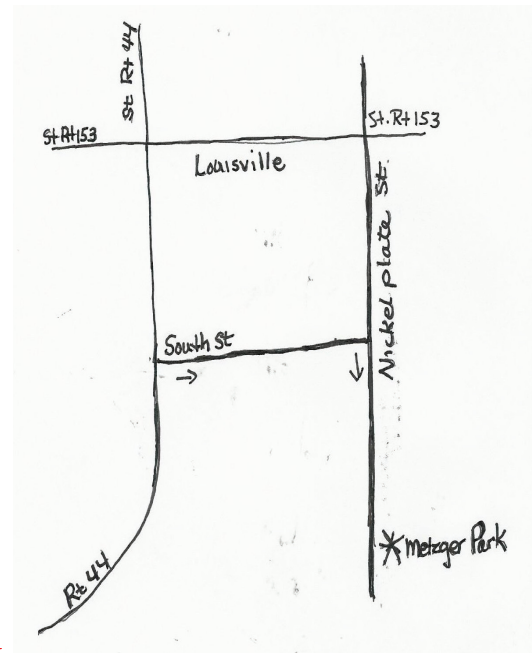

STEEL WHEEL TOUR REPORT

The Steel Wheels Tour kicked off with the Pizza Wars and Ice Cream Extravaganza! We had 10 huge pizzas, 3 huge veggie trays and 125 individual servings of Handels Homemade Ice Cream. There were 5 ice cream servings left at the end of the party, and now we know who can finish 5 servings of ice cream in one sitting! Awesome! We were treated to an informative talk by Nick Carrabia from Summer Garden Foods (Gia Russa). He also brought 4 wonderful gift baskets that were won by Andrew Greene, The Petersons, The Plunketts and The Finks.

Monday, the tour headed out to the McKinley Memorial in Niles, Ohio, which was built in 1915. There are 40 busts of prominent Americans in the Memorial, all of whom paid considerable amounts to have their busts be part of the Memorial. The columns in front of the Memorial are all made of one solid piece of granite....many columns you see are made of stacked sections...but not these! Two doors down from the memorial, we also visited a replica of President McKinley's boyhood home.

We were visited by President McKinley, himself, who talked about history repeating itself. Of interest was the novel, "The Wizard of Oz", and how it could possibly have been written about the troubled times of the late 1800's. Google this, it is interesting!

After a wonderful lunch at Vernon's Cafe, the tour continued to Wagon Trails. The group was so polite and quiet on the way out to the animals but when the animals appeared everyone was on their feet laughing and smiling as they fed the camels, elk, bison, water buffalos, ostriches, zebras and all the other 60 animals found on this venue. What a fun and informative adventure!

Tuesday, we headed down to Salem, Ohio. First stop was the 3 building of the Salem Historical Society, packed with wonderful treasures and items from the past. In the auditorium, we listened intently to a talk about the Underground Railroad in Salem and the abolitionists that supported it. It was a somber experience to hear how mankind could treat each other in such terrible and cruel ways.

After we finished at the Historical site, we headed on to the *Udderly Smooth* plant in Salem for a tour of how Udder Cream is made. Although Udder Cream started as a product for cows, it is recognized nationwide as a quality skin cream. This company purifies its own water to ensure Udder Cream is a high quality product. The owners were so tickled we were there, they took a picture of us and our cars from a high lift, and Mrs. Kennedy, the owner, was treated to her life-long dream which was to ride in a rumble seat! After receiving complimentary samples of Udder Cream, we ventured on to the *Spread Eagle Tavern* for another wonderful meal and a tour of this 1837 building that has always been a tavern. We headed back to the hotel, stopping at White House fruit farms on the way, where more yummy treats were purchased.

Wednesday, the group was off to *Mill Creek Metro Parks* to Lanterman's Mill. Here, we toured the historic grain mill where the workings of the mill, and its 3 floors were experienced by the group.

We left the beauty of the falls and the old mill and drove the scenic road up to Fellows Riverside Gardens. We had lunch prepared for us by Jack Dravitz himself, and many had his specialty, a Rueben served on rye, while others had another specialty, Corned Beef on rye. The Kravitz deli cooks its own corned beef and turkey. After this delicious lunch, we gathered in the parking lot and headed down the beautiful park roads again. As we crossed the historic 1895 Suspension Bridge (built by the Youngstown Bridge Company), a professional photographer was on site to take a stunning picture of EACH CAR positioned with the beautiful bridge framing it in the background (see front cover of this edition of the Quail).

We lined up after the pictures and off we traveled to tour the WKBN studio. We broke up into groups and were treated to the ins and outs of running a TV station, seeing news reporters at work at



their desks, the computer servers, and studios we see on the news every day! Everyone thoroughly enjoyed this inside look into television.

All of a sudden it's the last day of the YOUNGSTOWN MODEL A FORD STEEL WHEEL TOUR. I can't believe how fast time has flown!!



The cars are ready to roll to downtown Youngstown & tour very special places. Our first stop is the *Butler Institute of American Art*. We break up into small groups with extremely trained and knowledgeable docents. Founded in 1919 by Joseph G Butler, Jr., the Butler Institute was the first museum of American art in America. The original structure dedicated in 1919, is an architectural masterpiece listed on the National Register of Historic places. The Butler's mission is to preserve and collect works of art in all media created by citizens of our country. The Institute's holdings now exceed 20,000 individual works, and the Butler is known worldwide as "America's Museum". In one morning, we experienced the most breathtaking American Art by premier American artists-- and even a Van Gogh! Lunch was served in the Butler itself, and we traveled 1/2 a block to the beautiful home of Olivia Arms, now *The Arms Family Museum of Local History*, located in a magnificent 1905 Arts and Crafts period residence. Again, in small groups, we toured the home and marveled at the interesting furniture and displays in the house, seeing wonderful architecture everywhere we turned.



After leaving the Arms Museum, we drove to the *DeYor Performing Arts Center*, located in the heart of Youngstown, and recognized as one of the most beautiful performance venues in the Midwest, and the long home of the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra. Originally constructed by the Warner Brothers in 1931, this magnificent theater, was built by Harry, Jack and Albert Warner as a memorial to their brother, Sam. Today, visitors can enjoy many concerts surrounded by cinema house opulence of a bygone era. We were even informed that the crest over one of the archways is seen as the door through which many a Looney Tunes character appears at the end of their cartoons.

We returned to the hotel and walked over to the White Fire Grill where the staff was prepared to serve only our group in the entire restaurant! Our food was excellent and the service very attentive!

Just when the gang thought the night was over, they were escorted to the private dining room where they were entertained by a professional magician, and laughter echoed through the room as Gary Morton infused his act with wit and humor.

On the way out of the restaurant, everyone picked up their tour souvenir--- a beautiful 8x10 photo of their car in Mill Creek Park!

We made friends, and memories on this tour to last forever.

I have been honored to have had everyone's trust in me for the tour, and most appreciative of all my dear friends in the Penn Ohio Model A Ford Club!
