One time while on tour, we put axle grease on the back side of the steering wheel of one of our members "A". He finally figured out who did it, then the next morning I grabbed the gear shift and got a gob of grease in my hand. Pay backs!!!! Then, the next morning, I found some wood blocks. I jacked up his "A" about one inch off the ground. We all got a kick out of that. It was all done in fun. On another trip down along the Ohio River, we stopped for the night at the No Tell Motel. We had newlyweds with us on their honeymoon. One of our member's room key was a master key for all of the rooms, so when the newlyweds turned in early, we all took turns in unlocking their door and all of us filed in their room with flashlights in our hands. We had a lot of fun on that trip!!! I could go on and on, but not enough space is available and besides, I could get in trouble!

Check the cover of the August 1971 "A" Quail Call Magazine to see where we went on the very first tour. Back in the day, we took a big tool box and lots of Model "A" parts. We had a tow vehicle bring up the rear for our first and second P-O tours. It took us a while to figure it out, but we did.

Meet Melvin and Gloria Allen: Some people play golf, others go fishing and some just fritter their time away. Gloria and I have been playing Model "A" for 60+ years. Our first "A" was a 1930 Roadster with no wheels, no fenders, no interior and a cracked engine block that was stuck. After weeks of soaking, oiling, gathering parts and an order from J.C. Whitney it ran! But barely! To quote my dad "If you are so determined to drive

that thing, we'll find you a motor." With powder boxes for seats and swimming goggles for the wind, my brother and I were on the road. (Eastern Kentucky gravel) We were the Kentucky James Deans!

On July 4, 1958, I fell in love! A second owner 1928 Tudor had come from Ohio. To quote dad again, "you don't want that old car". Well, I did. After cashing out all my paper route money and savings from being a "hose jockey" we brought her home. It was the ride to high school with mother in the back seat. We weren't allowed to park with the teachers in that "old car". We had to park across the street with the other kids.

In the fall of 1961, it was off to college in the "A". By this time, roof cement wasn't working to repair the top. We started to duplicate wood for a new top. It never happened!

After graduation the "A" was put in the barn. We moved to Freeport, Ohio from Eastern Kentucky. In Freeport, I found a true "A" friend in Jim McCartney, an early restorer and Penn-Ohio member.

We took the '28 apart. Some 50 years, two daughters, building our own house and starting an evening business, we took a ride back to our 50th high school reunion. My wife keeps saying "when are we going to ride in the pretty car?"

Along the way, we have driven other "A's". First it was a 1930 Tudor, then a 1929 60C 4 Door, and a 1931 Slant Window 4-door and an early 1931 Vicky.

We followed the Vicky for 35 years before the lady would agree to sell it. This has been a good original car that has been fun to drive and enjoy. They are only original once.

Gloria Jean has been a trooper down through the years! Parts under beds, in the china cabinet, in the attic and who knows where else. She would start to give a hard time about the '28 and I would come back with "dear, I've had that car longer than I've known you!"

Then there was the trip to Maysville Kentucky to meet our Tri County group returning from a trip to Nashville. We could not make the trip but were free to meet up on the return trip. We were in the '29 4-door and it was 102 degrees that day! Her face was blood red but her feet were cool when she laid down and put them out the window. Today, she always asks what the weather forecast is BEFORE we take a trip.

Over the 50 years the Tri County members have been friends forever. I think of Hank Menapace, Bill Reinhart, Denny Schrock, Dr. Summers, Jr. Trachsel, Chuck Kerns, The VanFossen brothers, Dr. Baker, Dave Shanklin, Gary Stewart and many others who have made "playing cars" a lifetime of FUN.



For Sale: 1931 (standard black) Tudor driving Model "A" for sale. Motor was rebuilt 8000 miles ago and insert bearings were installed. The car has an electronic ignition system, an emergency shutoff on the electrical system and when you turn the key off, it automatically shuts off the gas. It has a touring cam bored out 40 over, an S10, 5 speed transmission (the trailing arm, which can bend on this transmission I had engineered beefed up to take care of that problem. However, I have not installed it yet but it comes with the car.) The original "A" transmission comes with the car. For our comfort in touring with this car, I had installed 16" radial tires. The front axle has been bent so the wheels are straight up and down to improve steering and handling. New brakes were installed 2000 miles ago and there are cast iron drums on the front axle only. It has a complete 12 volt system with a CB radio installed over the windshield. It comes with a wolf whistle and an exhaust whistle. Included with the car is a large selection of parts: (3) 16" rims and (2) 19" rims (the 19" rims have Firestone blackwall tires on them). This is a traveling car. It has been from Toledo, OH to Maine and back and from Toledo to Mackinaw and back. It has also been driven to Key West from Lake Wales, Fl and back. This is a driving car not a show car. The condition of the car on a scale of 1 to 10 is about a 7. We are also offering as a package deal an enclosed trailer that we used to haul the "A" to Florida and back. It is a 2006, 24 foot trailer in fair condition. In the front of the trailer is a work bench and plenty of cabinet space for storing things. Also included, is the equalizer trailer hitch.
