

Saturday, May 28, 2016 was a bright sunny morning and 36 people with 15 Model A's and 5 modern cars set out on our latest adventure, a Mystery Tour. Jim and Pat Stafford were our directors. It was wonderfully planned. They did a fantastic job.

Our first stop was The Allen House in Kinsman, Ohio. The owner, Mr. Dick Thompson, told us about the history of the house, its occupants through the years, and all the work it took to restore a nearly 200-year-old house. From restoring the stone work, restoring the exterior wood, replacing the house's foundation, repairing sagging support beams, repairing the roof, removing walls not original to the house, and cleaning years of paint from the woodwork, he has guided the restoration with historical detail and devotion. The house was built in 1821. It still contains the original kitchen, interior woodwork and staircase. Although it has modern upgrades, the house can be rented for parties, weddings, and family gatherings; it's a monument to craftsmanship and the history of life from the 1800's. There are bedrooms that can be rented out, similar to a bed and breakfast.

Before leaving the Allen House, attendees were given a driving quiz. As we drove through the countryside, we were to answer questions about noteworthy sites on our travels.

Our second stop of the morning was The Barn Store, 5391 Hayes Road, Andover, Ohio (between Rt. 7 and 193; just south of Rt. 6). It's an Amish country store and gift shop. The store also sells oak and cherry furniture, bulk foods, candy, jams, jelly, and baked goods on Saturdays. They had wood porch swings, polymer Adirondack chairs in 15 colors, wooden bird houses, and hand woven rugs. It brought back pleasant memories of a simpler time. As the weather warmed up, it was time to move on our next stop.

On the road again, we took the scenic route through downtown Kinsman, Ohio and drove east toward the Pennsylvania state line. We passed very few cars on our ride through the countryside. As our caravan crossed into Pennsylvania, we encountered a large display of road art. An owner of a farm created an eclectic display of items on his property on both sides of the road. Items mentioned by attendees were stones in the yard that were in a heart shape, computer monitor, frying pan, plastic coat hangers strung together in a chainlike fashion, a Trump sign, mercury outdoor light, Pittsburgh Steelers blanket, any more items - too numerous to mention. It has to be seen to be believed.

Greenville is the home of the Greenville Railroad Museum. We got to inspect four different train cars. The largest was a steam engine. To see the engineer's cab, we had to climb a ten step stairway. With eight people listening to the tour guide, the cab was crowded. In the caboose, you could see where the crew spent time sleeping, cooking, and passing time while traveling the country by rail. The gift shop had lots of railroad items for sale. There were photographs of trains that were used through the decades by local railroads. Adjacent to the gift shop was the model train house. There were several model trains running on the train board. The surrounding areas had examples

of the equipment that the conductors used while doing their daily jobs. The train whistle was not functioning due to lack of steam; however, a person could ring the train bell.

It was past lunch time when we left the train museum. Everyone was anxious to get to the restaurant. The outdoor temperature soared to 90 degrees; and the humidity had been rising steadily all day. Everyone was looking forward to spending some time in the air conditioning. Our reservation was waiting for us at The Bent Fork on Sixth Avenue in Greenville. The owner and our hostess, Monica welcomed us at the door. The patrons at the restaurant were excited to see all the Model A's in the parking lot. They do draw attention. Just as we settled into our seats to order our dinner, there was a crack of thunder and it started to rain. But we were safely inside and dry.

The food was delicious. The restaurant makes everything from scratch. One bite and you knew it was true. While everyone was ordering, Pat and Jim reviewed the driving quiz. The winners with 90% correct answers were Von & Kathy Wolfe. There was a tie for second place; Bob & Jean Evans and Gene & Donna Green. The award for "needs improvement" was given to George and Judy, who got the fewest correct. Monica visited each table and talked to us and invited us back. The interior of the Bent Fork is charming. It's as unique as the owner. Chandeliers abound and are made from cups & saucers, car rims and chain, and stained glass. The dining room is divided into smaller sections. It allows for quiet conversations and it is cozy. It's worth the drive. By 4 P.M., our excursion was complete. Good day, great food and better friends.


The Carousel was once considered an exhilerating ride and very tame by today's standards. It was originally invented in the 12th century to train knights for competition in Carosello games. The French changed the carosello game into an exhibition of horsemanship pagentry and exhibition, and the name transitioned to Carousel. Carousels were most popular from 1890 to 1930.

For Sale: 1931 (standard black) Tudor driving Model "A" for sale. Motor was rebuilt 8000 miles ago and insert bearings were installed. The car has an electronic ignition system, an emergency shutoff on the electrical system and when you turn the key off, it automatically shuts off the gas. It has a touring cam bored out 40 over, an S10, 5 speed transmission (the trailing arm, which can bend on this transmission I had engineered beefed up to take care of that problem. However, I have not installed it yet but it comes with the car.) The original "A" transmission comes with the car. For our comfort in touring with this car, I had installed 16" radial tires. The front axle has been bent so the wheels are straight up and down to improve steering and handling. New brakes were installed 2000 miles ago and there are cast iron drums on the front axle only. It has a complete 12 volt system with a CB radio installed over the windshield. It comes with a wolf whistle and an exhaust whistle. Included with the car is a large selection of parts: (3) 16" rims and (2) 19" rims (the 19" rims have Firestone blackwall tires on them). This is a traveling car. It has been from Toledo, OH to Maine and back and from Toledo to Mackinaw and back. It has also been driven to Key West from Lake Wales, Fl and back. This is a driving car not a show car. The condition of the car on a scale of 1 to 10 is about a 7. We are also offering as a package deal an enclosed trailer that we used to haul the "A" to Florida and back. It is a 2006, 24 foot trailer in fair condition. In the front of the trailer is a work bench and plenty of cabinet space for storing things. Also included, is the equalizer trailer hitch.
