


Penn Ohio Members will return to Great Race

While our the car had a fresh motor, there were times when more torque was need to maintain assigned, speeds up a hill. So modifications were made this winter including a Riley Two-port Overhead Valve conversion and Burns single downdraft manifold with Strumberg 97 carb. Electric fuel pump and pressure regulator as well as electronic ignition was also added.
