

# Lake Erie Shores Tour

The weather was great all week for the Penn Ohio Lake Erie Shores Tour with 42 families/members who attended with 35 Model A's & 7 modern cars driven. Only one major Model A breakdown happened with a broken axle. We had one birthday celebrated on the tour for Bryce, grandson of Liningers of Five Points, and one anniversary for Alexanders of Copus Hill.



Our first stop was Pheasant Run Airport in Leroy Twp. Here we saw a collections of vintage airplanes that were collected over the years by a couple, Gretchen and Chuck Reed, both private pilots & members of NEO Chapter at one time. Since his passing, Gretchen has donated use of her airport to Lake Erie College to incorporate into their curriculum to offer Aviation to the students who attend this school. This college is known for their Equestrian program offered also.



Before beginning the Lake Erie Coastal Tour, we traveled over West Liberty Covered Bridge, the shortest in the United States at 18 feet. We then continued on to Geneva-on-the-Lake which was a favorite annual retreat for three good friends: John D. Rockefeller, Harvey Firestone, and Henry Ford. They camped and fished at what is now known as Ohio's First Summer Retreat. Everyone was on their own to

explore the wineries along the lake, restaurants & stores with one being Frank's Toy Box with antique memorabilia. The three grandchildren on the tour stopped at Adventure Zone & had their own fun also. The beginning of the Coastal Tour along Lake Erie began here. We passed by other



parks along Lake Erie on our way to the Hubbard House Underground Railroad Museum in Ashtabula. The Hubbards were abolitionists and their home became an important stop in the Underground Railroad in Ohio. They provided food, shelter & clothes for the slaves escaping the South. Their home served as the end point before the slaves crossed Lake Erie into Canada. A lot of interesting history was given to us on this tour of the home (sorry, no pictures allowed inside).

Some members stopped at the Ashtabula Maritime Museum just a block down by the harbor and found this place very interesting as well.

Then, it was on to historic Bridge Street in Ashtabula Harbor. Those who wanted to stop & visit the shops did so and some continued along the way traveling over the Bascule Lift Bridge at Ashtabula Harbor which raises every 1/2 hour, built in 1925 & only a few left in the country. Our last stop for the day was Lake Shore Park, a beautiful park on Lake Erie. Many of us parked our cars along the beach, got a fresh

squeezed lemonade to drink or an ice cream cone to enjoy from the concession stand & sat on the bench swings on the longest pavilion on the Great Lakes & enjoyed the view of the lake & the breeze coming off of it. Some of the grandchildren and adults enjoyed wading out in the lake also. Just a very peaceful & relaxing stop to visit with other Chapter members before heading back to the hotel as we ended the first half of the Coastal Tour here for the week.



Wednesday, was a trip to Cleveland by bus. This was a chance for the men to relax from driving & just sit back & leave the driving to the buses & trolleys. We first toured Cleveland on the Lollythe-Trolley & learned a lot about the history of Cleveland along with all the new developments

going on in the city. It was amazing to see how huge the Cleveland Clinic campus is and drive past all the ethnic cultural gardens planted on the way to Rockefeller Greenhouse Gardens.











The trolley dropped us off at Crop Bistro in Ohio City for lunch. This was originally a old bank building from 1923 restored to a beautiful restaurant both upstairs and down. The architecture & ceilings were beautiful. We ate downstairs inside the actual vault of the bank that still has the original doors. It was really amazing and the food was great.









From there, the buses picked us up & took us to Lake View Cemetery where we viewed Wade Chapel with its beautiful Tiffany stained glass windows and walls.





We also toured President Garfield's Memorial where a brief history was given.







The docents pointed out places in the cemetery along the way where many famous people were buried including John D. Rockefeller & Elliot Ness. Actually, Ness's ashes are scattered in one of the ponds within the cemetery. Then, we made our way back to the hotel on the buses. It was a very informative, relaxing and enjoyable day.

Thursday, was our wineries & covered bridges day beginning with a couple stops in the morning. The group split up into two groups in order to facilitate the number of people visiting these smaller venues.....The Victorian Perambulator Museum and Brandt's Apple Orchard.







The Victorian Perambulator Museum in Jefferson, a very unique, one of a kind museum. Perambulators are wicker baby carriage which you would be amazed to see so many different features and designs they had. One was even shaped like a Model T car! There were so many other antique collectables inside from old phonographs to china dolls, toys and so on. You name it, it was there and this was just a part of what these twin sisters have collected over the past 40 years. One unique piece was the miniature carriage that was used to give Queen Elizabeth and Princess Margaret rides around the castle grounds when they were just small girls.







The other half of the group went to Brandt's Apple Orchard in Ashtabula. We were lucky the tour was in August as they are only opened seasonally, mid-August through the Fall. Here we saw and heard about their antique apple press that they still use weekly for their apple cider and slushies....great treats along with their baked goods.

The group switched & along the way to both places traveled over the Smolen Gulf Covered Bridge built in 1868, the longest in the United States at 619 feet. We also traveled over the Doyle Covered Bridge built in 1868 and the Harpersfield Covered Bridge located in a beautiful Metropark along the river.













Then it was off to a winery of your choice for lunch. Of the 23 local wineries, 6 were chosen for places to visit due to their beautiful settings & estates as well as available shopping. Even if you were not a wine connoisseur, the facilities were amazing to visit.

Friday, we visited a historic settlement in Kirtland which has been restored. A lot of history again along with original buildings and actual reconstructed replicas of the ashery & sawmill used to build the community of Kirtland. The grounds were beautiful.













We then went to Steele Mansion located in Painesville across from Lake Erie College. Here we had another amazing & delicious meal for our banquet, a day early, however it turned out very well even though it wasn't the end of the tour. The history & tour of this magnificient home was wonderful. We passed out gifts to 9 families/members as it was their 1st Penn Ohio Tour and to those who helped before & during the tour. Gifts were also given to who traveled the furthest in a Model A, who owned their Model A the longest driven on tour, the couple married the longest, those who helped with creating the logo & making the radiator plaques for the cars, who sent their registration first, and who finished paying for their trip in full first. Also a "Cleveland" shopping bag with drawings of all the buildings/places we saw on our Cleveland tour was passed out to all as a souvenir of the trip & a thank you for joining us on the tour.. Gifts to the grandchildren were given as well.













The rest of the afternoon was spent shopping in Geauga County at three favorite stops of NEO Chapter: Sunrise Farms in Burton, White House Chocolates in Middlefield, and End of the Commons General Store in Mesopotamia. All stores unique in their own way & all offered free samples of food. Sunrise Farms changes every month from beautiful accessories for your home, clothing, food mixes, jams, flowers, vegetables, etc. This month, they had delicious peaches, the best we had all summer. White House Chocolates is housed in a "white house" with wonderful homemade chocolate candies & treats and just added ice cream & custards to their store. The End of the Commons General Store has been in operation since 1849 & is the oldest in Ohio. They have tons of old fashioned candy, household items, and old time memorabilia.

Our last day of the tour was the continuation of the Lake Erie Coastal Tour from Lake Shore Park to the D-Day Reenactment, an awesome program put on each year by 1500-1700 volunteers at Conneaut Township Park. There are many other reenactments going on during this 2-day event, with boat rides given, however the invasion of Normandy, France, is the one you really want to see. This is an hour long presentation with vintage airplane bombers flying overhead the whole time of the show as the war is taking place on the beach of Lake Erie from boats coming to shore with soldiers to the actual fighting on the beach. This is the biggest reenactment in the world done not for entertainment but to keep alive the memories of our veterans who fought in the war, lest we not forget, what they did for all of us. This was a very chilling, powerful, historical event that happened 78 years ago. All veterans were honored at a special tent set up at this event. Many people drove back to the hotel afterwards & had dinner at nearby restaurants & some ate at some listed along the way home. I believe some even went to a movie at the the theater within walking distance from the hotel one evening during the week also.

























The many months of planning for this tour came & went so quickly for us. Although we said everything that could've happened to this tour did actually happen, it still turned out very nicely. It truly was a labor of love for all of you & didn't scare us off from doing another one. Once beginning the planning of this tour we realized & found so much more in the area to show everyone; just not enough time to do all in one week's time. Another tour of the area is already in the planning for another year down the road. NEO would like to travel out of our neck of the woods next year. Out of state is always fun, but if no one knows where to go, just look in your own backyard & surrounding counties as it's new to all the other Penn-Ohio members. And while you're searching, things will pop up that you didn't even know was there. Sometimes they aren't in the tour books either. So, get your thinking caps on & start planning. None of us are travel agents & it's ok if you make a mistake as no one cares. We all just want to spend time together enjoying places that our states & others have to offer. We were hesitant to do a tour close by, but five NEO Chapter families/members joined us on their 1st Penn Ohio tour & loved it. We're hoping they will continue to go on future annual Penn-Ohio tours & monthly Penn-Ohio events offered also. Jeff & I are anxious to show you more of Northeast Ohio, to finish where we left off.


