the correct sequence. You RECEIVED the correct number of issues, they were just titled incorrectly and jumped from May 2019 to July 2019....SORRY!!!





Anytime 11 Model A's assemble in a Kroger parking lot on a "fallish" sort of Saturday morning on September 28, you KNOW it's gonna be a great day!!! Rick and Becky Tittlebaugh and Jeff and Carolyn Long had Copus Hill up and running northerly to Oberlin and the Weltzheimer- Johnson House, or simply known as the Frank Lloyd Wright House. The house was commissioned from Wright in 1947 (completed in 1949) by businessman Weltzheimer and his family and is designed to reflect its environment and uses four principal materials: redwood, brick, concrete and glass..... lots of floor to ceiling glass that take in the view of the wooded landscape. With no basement, attic or garage, the home has the basic L-shaped floor plan with 3 bedrooms, 2 baths, kitchen and polished cement floors and a large open living area. Of special interest were the redwood paneled ceilings, long bookcase walls and roof ornamentation made from hundreds of stained croquet balls.





In 1968, Ellen Johnson (hence the double name) who was an art historian, purchased the house and over saw some restoration. (One short term owner had painted over all the redwood paneling!!!) Upon her death in 1992, the house was given to Oberlin College and is part of the Allen Memorial Museum. Our guide was most knowledgeable and even played the piano in the livingroom.

Then, off to lunch in downtown Oberlin at the Black River Cafe.....lots of good breakfast and lunch choices. Some of us walked to Gibson's Famous Chocolates before we headed westerly
