In my Five Points Chapter, two of our newest members have embraced the non-restored type A as their preference. They have been made safe and reliable, and yes that cost a fair amount of money, but a lot less than a restoration. These owners are having a ball and they don't have the equivalent of a modest 401K invested!

So, if you come across a Model A that looks forlorn, neglected, maybe hopeless to restore, think twice. It's likely worth saving! If you are not in the position to take on an "A rescue", make others aware of it. These cars should be saved!




