

# PENN-OHIO MEMBERS ARE VERY TALENTED September Meet, Hosted by Ridge Runners

The September Meet of the Penn-Ohio "A" Ford Club was hosted by the Ridge Runners Chapter at Oil Creek State Park near Titusville, PA. Attendees were given the option of taking a train ride, visiting the Drake Museum, and/or participating in the Gas Up festival on Saturday, September 15. Approximately 35 members enjoyed a 3-hour ride on the Oil Creek Railroad through the "Pennsylvania Wilds"



Riders had the choice of staying on the train for the whole three hours or stopping at the Petroleum Centre Station for an hour-long guided tour, hosted by volunteers of Oil Creek State Park. The tour guides were dressed in period clothing and told the story of how the population of the town of Petroleum Centre grew from 500 to over 3000 in a few short weeks when oil was discovered. Fast growth and lack of local law enforcement's presence allowed dance halls, gambling dens, and even a house of ill-repute to thrive. The historical narrative was supported by a diorama showing how the town looked in the 1850s. Now, the only building standing is the train station.

Several members also visited the Drake Well Museum. Exhibits there focus on the American oil industry and Colonel Edwin Drake's oil well, drilled in 1859. The artifacts in the museum tell the story of Titusville's part in the history of oil and are accompanied by many hands-on exhibits.

The third activity was the Gas Up Festival with exhibitions of small antique gas engines. This is a yearly event, sponsored by the Pioneer Steam and Gas Engine Society.

The day ended with meals at Titusville restaurants. The Blue Canoe Restaurant and Brewery was a popular choice as well as Sam's Restaurant. The lobby of the Comfort Inn provided a place for Penn-Ohio friends to socialize after dinner.

#### SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 16TH --- PENN OHIO'S GOT TALENT

Over 100 Penn-Ohio members attended the Sunday Meet at Oil Creek Park near Titusville. The sunny, warm weather was perfect for a picnic in the park. Thirty-three Model A's were driven and fourteen modern cars.

The theme of the meeting was "Penn-Ohio's Got Talent." The truth of the theme became evident as talented members of our clubs performed. Ridge Runners shared their talents, but they were not included in the competition. Bob Fink began the show with a humorous song, "Big Fat Bob," that he composed and sang to the tune of Jimmy Dean's Big Bad John. Two other Ridge Runners performed: Don Niederriter auctioned off a Model A model car kit to raise money for a "makebelieve" GoFundMe project, and Judie Maholtz read a poem that she wrote about her decision to join the Penn-Ohio Club. As already mentioned, the Ridge Runner were not placed in the competition. There were NINE entries that competed from other chapters, revealing the wide range of interests and abilities of our members. Sharon Leroux of Flying Quail had the crowd in stitches (knitting stitches) as she told us jokes while displaying her knitting projects. The group awarded her first place. Julie Barker of Five Points won second place for display of agility and rhythm as she stacked and arranged cups in sync with a musical selection. There was a tie for third place...
