It will be extremely difficult for any chapter to equal the August Penn-Ohio meet sponsored by Rubber City.




COPUS HILL Correspondent: Mary Jane Saylor

Copus Hill headed out of Shelby on August 12th behind Don Cover and Rachel Meade to unknown destinations. The 7 Model A's and a modern followed them westerly (sort of) through lush fields of corn and soy beans and beautiful farms with flowers that had too many Rose of Sharon to count, on rural roads that at times resembled cow paths!!! The pace was quick as our tour of the Hord Family Farms located southwesterly of Bucyrus was awaiting. As we entered the drive across the road from a mammoth grain processing plant, we were joined by two more Copus Hill A's. We parked in front of a "Barn" .. no ordinary barn by a long shot! Upon entering, we learned of this multi-generational enterprise from Duane Hord who gave an interesting insight into this operation. There are 20,000 artificially inseminated sows whose litters of piglets (as many as 600,000 a year and who weight approximately 3 1/2 pounds at birth) are weaned at 3 weeks and tranferred to over 100 partner farms in Ohio and western Pennsylvania. There, they roam until reaching market weight...usually about 150 pounds in 15 weeks. They are fed a hormone free food predominately plant based diets of corn and soy beans and vitamins and minerals for each stage of growth. These pig farms are in contract to receive feed from Hord Farms (hence the huge grain mill) and ferilitizer (pig poo!!) that they can use to reduce the cost of buying it which reduces farm expenses. In addition to the 6500 acres of crops (which produce the feed), the 150+ employees make 4000 tons of feed each week and also tend to 900 head of cattle. All animal waste is used on the fields but with a method that stirs up the ground to 4 inches and then is "manured" and covered back up. Duane says they notify the neighbors when they will be "fertilizing" so they can plan accordingly. He took us on a wagon ride that had actual seats and John Deere awnings through some of the cattle areas...putting Copus Hill on a wagon ride through cows with ear tags made for a crazy ride!! This "barn" we parked in front of is the corporate headquarters/visitor center/offices for Hord Farms... all keeping track of pigs, cows, grain and pig farmers in the "super farm" set up. The barn is complete with large room for weddings and meetings...the wooden spiral staircase in the silo is awesome!! Amish built and completed in 2016, it is truly a "farmer's dream"!! We thanked Duane for the ride and most interesting tale of "partnered out" pig and grain farming....I may NEVER look at a pork chop the same! Then, we headed to Upper Sandusky for lunch at the Village Restaurant....yes, pork WAS on the menu!! It was NOT on the menu at our ice cream stop, however! As we headed for home, we thanked Don and Rachel for a fascinating and educational trip!!!





For Sale: 1931 (standard black) Tudor driving Model "A" for sale. Motor was rebuilt 8000 miles ago and insert bearings were installed. The car has an electronic ignition system, an emergency shutoff on the electrical system and when you turn the key off, it automatically shuts off the gas. It has a touring cam bored out 40 over, an S10, 5 speed transmission (the trailing arm, which can bend on this transmission I had engineered beefed up to take care of that problem. However, I have not installed it yet but it comes with the car.) The original "A" transmission comes with the car. For our comfort in touring with this car, I had installed 16" radial tires. The front axle has been bent so the wheels are straight up and down to improve steering and handling. New brakes were installed 2000 miles ago and there are cast iron drums on the front axle only. It has a complete 12 volt system with a CB radio installed over the windshield. It comes with a wolf whistle and an exhaust whistle. Included with the car is a large selection of parts: (3) 16" rims and (2) 19" rims (the 19" rims have Firestone blackwall tires on them). This is a traveling car. It has been from Toledo, OH to Maine and back and from Toledo to Mackinaw and back. It has also been driven to Key West from Lake Wales, Fl and back. This is a driving car not a show car. The condition of the car on a scale of 1 to 10 is about a 7. We are also offering as a package deal an enclosed trailer that we used to haul the "A" to Florida and back. It is a 2006, 24 foot trailer in fair condition. In the front of the trailer is a work bench and plenty of cabinet space for storing things. Also included, is the equalizer trailer hitch.
